I thought we would talk about the Volunteer Program and the various area gardens we maintain for our readers who are unfamiliar with the Program. Six years plus ago, we put together the Program with a Mission, Vision, Protocol as to the Monks and the restricted areas and various maps. Here goes:

#### Volunteers as Co-Laborers with the Monks

The Abbey relies on countless volunteers to co-labor with them to continue the monastic tradition of cultivating and caring for creation as stewards, co-creators, and partners with creation to glorify God, conserve, protect and restore nature and to advocate nature's beauty and its power to communicate God's love, provision and peace."

### **Mepkin Abbey Mission Statement**

"We the monks of Mepkin Abbey, bear witness to the contemplative monastic tradition in this particular place and time in the following ways:...

We make available to our visitors the natural beauty of Mepkin by developing and maintaining the public gardens of the monastery."

### **Garden Vision Statement**

Mepkin Abbey strives to maintain our gardens in a planned way so that they always look pleasant and present the welcoming face of Mepkin Abbey to the public while bringing a sense of satisfaction and accomplishment to our volunteers.

#### Volunteer Protocol

### In the Monastic Enclosure

The Monastic Enclosure is everything beyond the brick wall in front of the Church and its imaginary extension to the Senior Wing.

The following are the monk's guidelines for this area:

#### **Places of Silence**

- The area of the Church and dormitories is a place of silence. Short necessary exchanges are appropriate, but if we need to prolong them, there are places set aside for such (music Room, Sacristies, Chapter Room and Novitiate Classroom). An easy demarcation for this area is the serpentine wall and its invisible extension to the vicinity of the bike garage. The section of the public walkway stretching from the Library to the Church is a place of "quiet" (subdued talking) where our guests are asked to respect the monastic dwelling nearby. The gathering place in front of the Church is included in this request. All of us need to be mindful of the need for quiet in this area when greeting guests and visitors
- We ask our volunteers to respect these guidelines while working in these areas. We ask you not to initiate conversation with the monks, or play radios in this area and under no circumstance or for any reason to go to a monk's private room.

#### **Volunteer hours and Service Pins**

Mepkin Abbey Volunteers are asked to report their service hours. This may be done in two ways. Either email the hours to <a href="mailto:brstan41@gmail.com">brstan41@gmail.com</a> or note them each time you come on the sheet in the Break Room. We ask that you do this so we can use these in any grant we seek for Mepkin and they are a strong statement in our vision and media work. These are added up at the end of June for the twelve previous months before the Annual Volunteer Picnic and Service Pins are awarded. We ask that you wear these when working for identification on the grounds. If you are new and have not worked long enough for a pin, your Volunteer shirt will be your identification.

The Service Pins are awarded in this way:

Black for 50 hours Red for 150 hours Green for 300 hours Purple for 500 hours Blue for 750 hours Gold for 1000 hours

These are awarded at the July picnic and are cumulative.




