The various tasks of March, such as fertilizing/applying aluminum sulfate to the Hydrangeas were completed as has pruning and planting the various new shrubs and trees. We held up on fertilizing the Daylilies this year, as the Russian Sage (in the same area) took over last year! The Azaleas have bloomed and we are getting ready for the the annual “feed the azaleas and camellias program”. We did not burn the bog this year as Peter has been opposed to it and so the fields were cut. We will see how that turns out so far as keeping some diversity in the Labyrinth.

The weather continues to be crazy—hot, cold, frost warnings. This plays havoc with trying to keep up with the every present weed war. That will be a main focus for us this month. Watering all the new plantings and pots has also been a task. Hopefully we will not lose any of our new plantings.

GARDEN UPDATES:

Store/ St. Clare:

We were able to get the Acuba planted as a start to the screen I mentioned last month. Hopefully they will quickly grow and we can fill in with Palmettos or something similar. Again, the weeds are ahead of us at present, but we will continue to work on that.

Orchard:

The orchard is coming back to life, at least most of it. We lost a Cara cara orange and a substantial amount of one of our figs but for the most part flowers and buds are covering most of the plants. Norm and I uncovered the citrus plants and put away the heat lamps for another season. There were two oranges left on one of the Satsuma oranges. They had been hidden until we had the plants wrapped and it wasn't worth digging them out. The plants have fearsome thorns.

The blackberries look great but the raspberries need a patient hand and perhaps another season to recover.

We are investigating a conversion to electric fence instead of the plastic deer fence which has seen better days. Jimmy Livingston (a real farmer) believes we can keep the deer out with a less obtrusive fence. While we were inspecting the current fence Jimmy spotted a hole that he thought had been made by a turtle looking for some soft earth to lay her eggs. If that's so the ground is definitely soft since we have been digging up weeds and turning in the mulch we have spread over the years.

All we need now are the beginnings of some fruit.

How Mepkin Abbey Supports Itself:



I was Born in Arlington, Washington. I moved to Mt. Pleasant in the Old Village when I was 2 years old and lived there until the age of 20. Dad met Mom when he was in the Navy and on his way to Sullivan's Island where he was living at the time. I've been collecting Vinyl LP's since I was 11yrs. old. My interest is from 1964 until 1986 and I currently have 2500 records (150 have never been opened). I was with Millie Lewis Models in Charleston and was discovered by Faces Models in NYC, working with them from 1983 until 1986. I had to come home because my younger brother was diagnosed with Lymphoma Cancer. Thankfully, they caught it in time. I enrolled in EMT Basic Training at Trident Tech, did my EMT-Intermediate Training & Advanced EMT- Training at Cape Fear Community College in Wilmington, North Carolina. I am also a Nationally Registered Advanced EMT which means I can work in any State without having to take their State Boards. I became totally burned out of Emergency Work after 12yrs. I lost my partner of 12yrs to Liver Cancer. He was 53 and my one & only true love. His Death brought me to Mepkin where I have grown in my Faith tremendously and have made many wonderful Friends.
